On Saturday 11 May, the AGM of the Bath and Wells Diocesan Association of Change Ringers was held at South Petherton.

The Association, which was founded in 1890, is headed by a Master. In other associations this position can be titled Chairman or President.

The present Master, Rev Mark Jackson, had indicated he would not be standing for re-election in 2024. It has been a tradition since the Association was founded that the Master has been a clergyman. Some years ago, a proposition was put forward that the position could be held by clergy or non-clergy, however, this was voted against overwhelmingly!!

Father Guy had been approached about taking on the position and he was voted in as Master. He becomes the fifteenth Master in the history of the Association.

Reflections from the Ministry Team

Dear Friends,

Following our Annual Parochial Church meeting on the 21st April, I offer you the 'report' I made in the context of the sermon I preached that day. So here we go.......



From our Gospel reading today, "I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold." (John 10:16)

I ended my report at last year's APCM saying "I am confident we have the green shoots of emerging hope. With that hope in mind, we step forward into God's future as a modern catholic worshipping community seeking to be inclusive, intergenerational, diverse, caring for creation, and striving to worship God in the beauty of holiness."

The green shoots of hope I mentioned last year continue to emerge. With Philip's enthusiasm, and his teaching background, our Launchpad initiative started at the beginning of this academic year. Every half-term both year six classes from our church school, come into church for a time of reflection, activity, and learning. Each session lasts between 1½ to 2 hours, and they draw to a close with drinks, cakes, and fruit – all eagerly consumed by the children! Our aim is to build our relationship with the children so that they know their church is a safe place for them, and that we are here if they need help as they transition to secondary school, or just need a space to meet old friends.

Our relationship with St. John's School has improved no end, and it's a real joy to welcome children, with their families, and staff members to our Sunday worship. It is also heartening that links with MSN Primary School, Welton Primary School and Norton Hill Primary School continue to grow in positive ways.

Please be assured that our ministry with children is growing and we welcome them all into their Parish Church several days a term.

There are green shoots of growth within our worshipping as well. It is good to see we have young families with children joining us at the Parish Eucharist regularly. We also see some younger faces, which are encouraging signs of diversity and a blend of generations.

With these evolving signs of growth, I would suggest that in the months to come we introduce a Family Eucharist on the first Sunday of the month. This service would be geared to involve all ages, it would be more interactive, a bit less formal, but remain Eucharistic at heart.

We are also engaging with "folds" in the wider community. We are now offering seasonal worship (Service of the Word) to clients of Age Concern at the Orchard Community Centre and at Greenacres sheltered accommodation. And we are holding monthly services at Combe Lea residential home.

It is also encouraging to welcome the wider community into their Parish Church. These events include the monthly lunchtime concerts with Trio Paradis, the wonderful Christmas Tree Festival, the Carol services for Rotary Club and Probus, musicians and singers for concerts. These connections with the wider community are important and show that our doors are open, please come in.

Despite these green shoots of hope, we have a nettle to grasp!

Our Diocese is facing an annual deficit of well over £1 million.

Our Diocese is grappling with the nettle of a significant fall in parish share receipts into the Common Fund. This fall makes it difficult for the Diocese to cover the cost of paid ministry and the associated support costs for parishes, schools, and chaplaincies. This fall in parish share receipts comes against a backdrop of the COVID pandemic and a cost-of-living crisis.

Based on the parish share currently paid, only 20% of benefices cover the cost of paid ministry and associated support, with the remaining 80% of benefices having their paid ministry and associated support subsidised through the Common Fund. This is not a sustainable financial position. So the Diocese has tried to "cut its cloth" where it can. Posts have been paired back at Flourish House, but significantly it is now cutting back Parish Priest posts by 28.

So, the nettle we have to grasp is a 15% increase in the request for Parish Share, which for this year is £54,543. Last year it was £47,429. However, we must recognise that our Diocese has not increased our Parish Share request in line with inflation since COVID, recognising the financial strain many parishes were experiencing.

I am aware that many of you are generous in your giving of time, talents, and treasure. But I have to ask you all to prayerfully consider the level of your current regular giving, and if at all possible, to increase your regular giving please. If you are a tax payer, can I encourage you to join the Parish Giving Scheme, which claims the Gift Aid on your donation every month. If you are not a tax payer, can I encourage you to increase your regularly giving by Standing Order, or if you use the weekly envelope scheme to increase your donation as much as possible. And if you are not currently giving regularly to please consider doing so. This may seem daunting, but as Easter people we give to express our love and gratitude to God for all that He is and all He has done for us. The generosity in our response enables our church to outwork its mission and ministry, living and telling the story of Jesus and transforming the community in which live and serve.

In the Gospel reading, Jesus describes his ministry as that of the shepherd. This metaphor is one that has inspired countless sermons and works of art. From my experience in farming, I find it hard to block out the picture I have of a shepherd I worked with, one who was far from good! Yet when I hear Jesus described as the Good Shepherd I am taken back to my ordination as a priest in Peterborough Cathedral. During the Ordination the Bishop says, "Priests are called to be servants and shepherds among the people to whom they are sent." What a responsibility, what a calling!

As the flock of Jesus in this place, and at this time, we are all called to shepherd one another with love and compassion, and we are also called shepherd those beyond the "fold".

I hope and pray that we continue to follow Jesus, our Good Shepherd, and inspired by his example open the gates of the fold to share God's love with all those from the wider community.

St John's Wednesday Lunchtime Concerts

This year's series of free Wednesday 1pm lunchtime concerts at St John's begins on 12th June with the Mendip Ensemble (Carole Jenner Timms-Flute, Simon Naylor-Oboe & Jacquelyn Bevan-Piano) playing music from the Baroque to present day.



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On 19th June violin virtuoso Matthew Taylor will perform an all-French programme including Saint-Saens' stunning Havanaise.

Other concerts include an organ recital by David Bednall on 26th June and St John's Primary School on 3rd July.

Entrance is by donation with a retiring collection and refreshments will be on sale half an hour before the concert.

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Ladies Group May Meeting

As the date of the meeting coincided with Ascension Day, we attended the Ascension Day service before gathering at the front of the church. Kate (assisted by Guy) had laid out an assortment of vestments used for different services during the church year which she then proceeded to explain when and how they are worn.



Choir Dress is a black cassock with a white surplice over. This is worn for Morning & Evening Prayer. The cassock may have 39 buttons which represent the 39 Articles of Religion. A cotta, which is similar to a surplice can be worn as an alternative to a surplice, usually more ornate with lace trimmings.

For Celebration of the Eucharist an alb (white) is worn under a chasuble. The chasuble is a seamless garment which comes in several different styles and can be of different colours some according to the church season.

A cope is a long cloak, open at the front and fastened at the breast with a band or clasp. It may be of any liturgical colour and can be very ornate. Guy modelled a cope which was a family heirloom, handed down to him from a relation of his maternal grandmother.

Kate then showed us her collection of stoles and explained the significance of them. Her ordination stole has a tree on one end designed by Alice, the boat on the other end was Clarrie's design. Others had connections with her ordination training and some in colours for the seasons of the church.

Numerous vestments have been in church for many years. We went into the Vicar's vestry and the contents of various drawers in the chest were revealed. One chasuble, (an ornate purple one) had a name tape it in. It looked like new. Kate had done some research and traced the history of the person who had owned it. He was a curate at St John's and left in 1968.

We see these vestments been worn at services and it was good to have them named and to be told how and when they are used.

Kate was thanked by us all for giving us such an enjoyable and informative evening. Thanks also went to Guy for assisting especially for moving the heavy vestments.

Archbishop joins us for Diocesan Day of Prayer

On Saturday, 7 September, everyone across our Diocese of Bath and Wells is invited to join in a Diocesan Day of Prayer for the communities we serve. Bishop Michael will be hosting a gathering in each of our archdeaconries, alongside Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury. Churches across the diocese are also invited to hold their own prayer gatherings with a focus on their local communities.

Bishop Michael says, "As churches we pray in and for our communities each and every day, but for this diocesan day of prayer I am encouraging every church to look afresh at the communities we serve and the multitude of ways we can and do pray for them. As well as being an opportunity to help us seek God's transformation for the communities we are a part of, I hope this will provide us with a chance to deepen our own faith and strengthen our church communities through prayer.

"I am always struck by how many people, even if they are not regular churchgoers, are pleased that they are being prayed for, and so this may be an opportunity to let our communities know that we are praying for our life together and how it might be transformed for good, as well as giving thanks for all that is good already."

As well as the gatherings across Bath and Wells, there will be resources and suggestions for more local prayer gatherings, on that day, and into the future.




One of the many things which drew me to this role is the privilege of prayer in your beautiful Cathedral Church. Each morning we gather and pray for the life of the diocese, and give thanks for that same life in the evening. Please be assured of my prayers for you in your mission and ministry and I warmly look forward to getting out to explore the diocese.

As I reflect on this time of change, I am mindful of the importance of finding patterns of prayer to sustain our lives, and nourish our spiritual growth. As Archbishop Desmond Tutu said many years ago, we must 'think of prayer as a relationship.' We are to invest in it, and to find space so that it can develop, and this takes time. Or as the mystic Evelyn Underhill put it, 'On every level of life, from housework to heights of prayer, in all judgement and efforts to get things done, hurry and impatience are sure marks of the amateur.'

We all know the importance of taking time to invest in relationships, and I love the challenge that hurry and impatience are sure marks of the amateur. As we reflect on our own prayer lives, I wonder if there are ways that we can deepen our relationship in prayer?

The Christian tradition is packed with ways to help people learn to pray. Maybe we can find ways to slow ourselves down and be more present to the gift of prayer, so that we may join in the Apostle Paul's prayer, 'we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding'.
